### PLAGIARISM — WHAT DOES IT MEAN?



- To take and use as one's own, the thoughts, writings or inventions of another (Oxford English Dictionary)<sup>1</sup>
- Presenting someone else's work as one's own irrespective of intention (UWL)<sup>2</sup>

#### Examples:

- Copying words/phrases from a text and not acknowledging the source
- Re-using text or images from the internet and not acknowledging the source
- Copying the work of another student without acknowledgement (including collusion)
- Re-using your own work (eg from another ressay) without acknowledging (self-plagiarism)
- Moving around the text of others to create your "own" text
- Using "essay writing services"


# HOW COULD YOU AVOID PLARIAGISM?

#### HOW TO PREVENT PLAGIARISM...

 Be organized when collecting information for your essay; note the texts and sources that you're using as you go along so that you have a record when writing up your essay

 Try and develop good summary skills, ie putting information in your own words... And remember, no one is expecting you to write better than any of the authors

Reference all of your work



## **SIMILARITY - TURNITIN**



**Turnitin** is used to check the "similarity" of a student's work compared to other works. It matches the text against:

- A database of previously submitted work from every institution that subscribes to Turnitin
- Current and archived internet pages
- Databases of journals and periodicals

The software then produces a report with an overall percentage similarity score.

#### **TURNITIN - SIMILARITY SCORE RANGES**



- Blue: No matching text
- Green: One word to 24% matching text
- Yellow: 25-49% matching text
- Orange: 50-74% matching text
- Red: 75-100% matching text
